RECOGNIZING THE MESSIAH

Messiah's Birth

The Old Testament does not say much about how the Messiah will be born. It does however specify that the Messiah will be born of a virgin and that he will be born in Bethlehem.

Messiah's Lineage

The Messiah will be a descendent of Abraham, Judah, and King David. God promised Abraham and David that one of their descendents would bless all people and reign forever.

Messiah's Ministry

The Old Testament prophets described the Messiah's ministry which would consist of miracles, teaching, pain, rejection by his people, and a humble background.

Messiah's Suffering

The Messiah is prophesied to suffer and die in our place. The Messiah will arrive humbly and die a wretched death in order to bring hope and salvation to all nations.

Messiah's Reign

The prophecies also announce that the Messiah will reign eternally as the righteous and just king from the line of David. Yes, the Messiah will be crushed by mankind but he will return victorious.

Messiah's Era

In one of the most detailed prophecies recorded in the Old Testament, Daniel revealed when the Messiah would begin his ministry on earth.

Israel's Rejection of Messiah

The Israelites were anticipating the Messiah but they were confused. They expected a conquering king but instead they should have been expecting a humble and suffering servant.

BIRTH OF THE MESSIAH

There are two primary prophecies concerning the Messiah's birth:



Mother

The Messiah will be born of a virgin.



Fulfillment

"This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit... The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" *Matthew 1:18,23*

Location

2 The Messiah will be born in Bethlehem. Fulfillment

"After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea... King Herod had called together all the people's chief priests and teachers of the law, he asked them where the Messiah was to be born. "In Bethlehem in Judea," they replied, "for this is what the prophet has written: "But you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for out of you will come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel."" *Matthew 2:1.4-6*

LINEAGE OF THE MESSIAH

The Messiah will be a descendent of... **Abraham** (Genesis 12:2-3 - Matthew 1:1) **Judah** (Zechariah 10:4 - Matthew 1:2) **David** (2 Samuel 7:12-16 - Matthew 1:6)

Genealogy of Jesus


Abraham

Matthew traces the genealogy of Jesus through His father Joseph while Luke likely traces Jesus' ancestry through his mother Mary.

This could be explained by Matthew tracing Jesus' lineage through His legal father in order to appeal to his Jewish audience which was his tendency while Luke highlights Jesus' humanity and therefore traces His lineage through His birth mother.

Another reason to take this stance is because Luke writes that Joseph was Jesus' father "so it was thought" (3:23).

Luke also had women in the spotlight throughout his gospel so it is logical that he traced Jesus' lineage through His mother in spite of this being abnormal for the time period.

SUFFERING OF THE MESSIAH

Why does the Messiah have to suffer?

The Messiah does not *have to* suffer, however God has chosen the Messiah to take on the punishment of our sins in our place. Isaiah says that the Messiah will be "pierced for our transgressions" and "crushed for our iniquities" (53:5). Messiah will die even though he is sinless (Isaiah 53:9) and his death will redeem sinners (Isaiah 59:20).

How does the Messiah

physically

The Messiah will be pierced (Zechariah 12:10) and beaten to the point where his appearance is disfigured (Isaiah 52:14). None of his bones will be broken (Psalm 34:20) but he will still be familiar with suffering (Isaiah 53:3).

spiritually

Messiah does not only experience physical pain, he experiences spiritual pain as well. Psalm 22:1 reveals the Messiah being forsaken by God. Isaiah writes that the Messiah will be a guilt offering who will die in our place (53:10).

alone

Prophets share that the Messiah will be abandoned not only by God but also by his friends and followers (Zechariah 13:7). The Messiah will be alone in one sense, however he will be killed with sinners (Isaiah 53:9) and will be mocked by onlookers (Isaiah 50:6).

ERA OF THE MESSIAH

"While I was speaking and praying, confessing my sin and the sin of my people Israel and making my request to the Lord my God for his holy hill— while I was still in prayer, Gabriel, the man I had seen in the earlier vision, came to me in swift flight about the time of the evening sacrifice. He instructed me and said to me, "Daniel, I have now come to give you insight and understanding. As soon as you began to pray, a word went out, which I have come to tell you, for you are highly esteemed. Therefore, consider the word and understand the vision:

"Seventy 'sevens' are decreed for your people and your holy city to finish transgression, to put an end to sin, to atone for wickedness, to bring in everlasting righteousness, to seal up vision and prophecy and to anoint the Most Holy Place. "Know and understand this: From the time the word goes out to restore and rebuild Jerusalem until the Anointed One, the ruler, comes, there will be seven 'sevens,' and sixty-two 'sevens.' It will be rebuilt with streets and a trench, but in times of trouble. After the sixty-two 'sevens,' the Anointed One will be put to death and will have nothing. The people of the ruler who will come will destroy the city and the sanctuary. The end will come like a flood: War will continue until the end, and desolations have been decreed. He will confirm a covenant with many for one 'seven.' In the middle of the 'seven' he will put an end to sacrifice and offering. And at the temple he will set up an abomination that causes desolation, until the end that is decreed is poured out on him."

"sevens"	represents 7 years
7 "sevens"	represents 7 periods of 7 years
62 "sevens"	represents 62 periods of 7 years
7 x 7 = 49 years	a year in Daniel's time was 360 days
62 x 7 = 434 years	483 years x 360 days = 173,880 days
49 + 434 = 483 years	173,880 \div 365 = 476 years and 140 days

476 years and 140 days after the decree to rebuild Jerusalem the Messiah would be cut off.

The decree to rebuild Jerusalem was issued in the twentieth year of King Artaxerxes (Nehemiah 2:1) which was approximately 445 BC. This puts the date of the Messiah being cut off around 31 AD.



ISRAELITES REJECTION OF THE MESSIAH

If the Messiah was prophesied so clearly, why did so many Israelites reject Him?

The Messiah's Roles

Suffering Servant

Jesus entered creation the first time as a suffering servant. He fulfilled the prophecies that talk about his birth, ministry, and suffering.

Conquering King

Jesus will return to fulfill the prophecies concerning His reign as conquering king.

The Israelites were so focused on the conquering king arriving that it clouded their interpretation of the Messianic prophecies. They should have realized that the Messiah would have to be crushed before ushering in his eternal kingdom and salvation for his followers.¹

Regardless, all of the Messianic prophecies clearly point to one individual:
